

Sean Bean—The award-winning actor grew up in Sheffield and attended Brook Comprehensive School - which unfortunately no longer exists. He went on to study welding at Rotherham College, before taking an art class and enrolling on a drama course at the college. Arctic Monkeys — Frontman Alex Turner and bandmates Matt Helders, Jamie Cook, Nick O'Malley and Andy Nicholson all come from High Green in Sheffield and met at Stocksbridge High School. They played plenty of small gigs in Sheffield - including their first ever one at the Grapes pub on Trippet Lane - before they became one of the most popular British indie bands of all time. Jarvis Cocker — The Pulp frontman was born in Sheffield and grew up in the Intake area of the city, where he attended City School. He then went on to study an access course at Sheffield Polytechnic, now known as Sheffield Hallam University, before winning a place at Central St Martin's College of Art and Design in London. AS Byatt—The Booker Prize-winning author Dame Antonia Susan Duffy (AS Byatt) was born in Sheffield and went to Sheffield Girls' School before her family moved to York, Photo: Neil Silk



Tom Ellis — Not everyone knows that the Lucifer and Miranda actor grew up in Sheffield, as he moved here when his father got a new job as a Baptist minister. He attended High Storrs School and played the French horn in the City of Sheffield Youth Orchestra. Helen Sharman—The first British person and Western European woman to go to space, astronaut Helen was born in Grenoside, where she attended Grenoside Junior and Infant School. Spotlight on: Careers in Geography



Geography is the study of places and the relationships between people and their environments. Geographers explore both the physical properties of Earth's surface and the human societies spread across it.

Geography is a really useful subject as the skills and knowledge you gain can be used in almost every job sector.



There are lots of geography related jobs available to deal with the consequences of climate change such as in flood risk management and environmental management.

There are practical roles working outside as a countryside ranger for the National Trust or planning sustainable transport networks for new towns. You could be using Geographical Information Systems (GIS) to plan where there is demand for a supermarket or working on a project for a charity overseas. Source: Careerpilot: Jobs by Subject



Geography often involves practical work so there are usually opportunities for fieldwork and travel.



Online prospectus and application system used by all Y11's in the Sheffield area to apply for sixth forms, colleges and training providers.



Can be used to **research** post 16 providers and courses without the need to be logged into your account



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Once logged into your account you can research, favourite, make and edit applications to your choice of providers and courses.



When you have completed your applications, you can use Sheffield Progress to track your applications and manage course offers.


Did you know that Sheffield Progress is not just for Y11's? The site can be used by anyone wanting to research the types of courses available after Year 11 as part of your career planning in any year. You do not require a 'login' to search for courses. Only Y11's will receive a personal 'login' for the site. Visit: www.sheffieldprogress.co.uk to enter.



Head to www.shefieldprogress.co.uk to have a look around. You may find some new ideas to look into! There are so many courses to study after Y11, but it is

important to start early so that you can work towards the grades needed and research your ideas in more detail to help you make important decisions when you finally reach Y11. Students in Y11 are currently using this platform to research, make and manage their post 16 applications.

By clicking on the tabs at the top of the home page you can find out information about courses, providers in our area, qualifications, (including types and levels) and much more. Sheffield Progress in an online prospectus and application system for young people in Y11 to apply to school sixth forms, colleges and training providers as part of their Post 16 Options process.

Students in all year groups can access Sheffield Progress without needing an account to research the range of learning opportunities associated with their own interest areas. For example, you could research courses such as A Level subjects at Tapton School Sixth Form, Art & Design at Sheffield College, Engineering at UTC, Construction at Nacro, Sport at Sheffield Wednesday, Beauty at White Rose, etc There are so many providers and courses to look at which should give you helpful information and inspiration for the future.
